MHNO HOSTS EAST END COMMUNITY SCHOOL ART SHOW AT HILL HOUSE Friday March 10 and Saturday March 11

The Munjoy Hill Neighborhood Organization and the East End Community School (EECS) arts program have joined in an exciting collaboration to bring the first annual student art show into the community. Art created by EECS elementary students will be on display at the MHNO's Hill House on Friday, March 10th, 5-8 pm for the gala opening, with the show continuing on Saturday, March 11th, from noon to 3. The Hill House, located in the heart of Munjoy Hill's commercial center at 92 Congress Street (the corner of Atlantic and Congress Streets), will make it convenient for neighbors to drop in to view the show.

The art on display will be creations by students in Pre-K through grade 5. A variety of media are used, appropriate to the grade level. The goal is to expose the students to art in its many forms. Pre-K students are learning to use a single color in an original piece. Grade 1 students have experimented with pattern weaving and repeating patterns. Layering landscapes have engaged Grade 2 students. The older, Grade 5 students create surprises with interesting gel prints.

People who do not have a child enrolled in our neighborhood school may not be aware of the full range of activities that take place at the school. According to the EECS's PTO, the school brings together children and teachers from 36 different countries speaking 31 different languages. It reports that the languages

spoken include Portuguese, Spanish, Somali, Arabic, French and American Sign Language, and "more than half of East End students are learning English as a second, third, or fourth language".

Art is an important language as well. The EECS has a vibrant art program, headed by art teacher Melissa Maher. MHNO Board Member and former arts educator Carol Connor is working with Ms. Maher to produce the show. This event coincides with the national recognition of March as Youth Art Month. The Council for Art Education, national sponsor of Youth Art Month promotes art education as an important tool to encourage children of all ages to express themselves, allowing them to translate thoughts and emotions into creative visual art.

Ms. Maher's enthusiasm for art and her dedication to her students is contagious! So please drop by to catch this great show and support our children, community and neighborhood school.
