MHNO SUSTAINABLE LIVING

Did anyone else on The Hill spot daffodils poking up out of the ground--in February?!

The groundhog may have forecast an early spring, but even Punxsutawney Phil could not have foreseen crocuses in Portland on Leap Day. Certainly the planners of the recently cancelled Can-Am Crown sled dog race wished it were not so. Over the recent school break, my own family, as well as several like-minded neighbors, traveled north in search of real winter—with mixed results and more rain than we expected midwinter above the 45th parallel.

But the data confirm these anecdotal observations with alarming emphasis. Gardening friends recently passed along the news that our local plant growing "hardiness" zone had shifted up by an entire level this past year. Maine, which has been warming relentlessly for two decades now, was almost 8 degrees warmer than normal last winter. So far, this winter, too, is bringing more rising temperatures and a whole lot less snow than normal. The North Atlantic's "crazy" heating is apparently even crazier than originally thought, and our own Gulf of Maine is warming faster than almost any surface area on the planet.

It has been quipped that, "Everybody complains about the weather but nobody does anything about it." But the IPCC was not joking when it stressed (with a bit of jargon and British spelling) that we *can* do something about the climate crisis: "behavioural change can reduce global GHG emissions of end-use sectors by at least 5% rapidly." Only 5 percent? Well, that's a lot more than zero, it's more than the entire air travel industry's share, and it's the minimum impact, which could amount to as much as a 30% reduction in greenhouse gas emissions. End-use sectors? Buildings, land transport, and food. The Maine Climate Council and One Climate Future confirm that buildings and transportation represent two of the biggest sources of emissions, and the biggest opportunities for improvement, in our corner of the world. Behavioural change? That's us, acting as "citizens, investors, consumers, role models, and professionals." Translation? You and I and all our neighbo(u)rs could *rapidly* reduce a

significant share of greenhouse gas emissions by making smarter food, transportation, and home energy choices on a day-to-day basis right here on Munjoy Hill.

Look no farther than down the block for real-world examples of homes running entirely on solar energy; cars being shared, eliminated, or electrified; and food waste cycling back into gardens instead of landfills. And look no farther than across town for Portland's own Home Energy Expo at Odd Fellows Hall on March 16th from 9:00 to 1:00, featuring free lunch and "practical solutions for home improvement and sustainability." Caveat emptor, but this could be a good place to begin or refine your research; to exercise your own individual agency; to advance the citywide goal of building (and retrofitting) better buildings; to make the most of Portland's Electrify Everything! program; and to help make Muniov Hill a model in combating the climate crisis.




